

Tissue Adhesives

Tissue adhesives or topical skin adhesives are sterile liquid adhesives that hold together the edges of a wound. They are used for small, clean fresh wounds, instead of stitches. The adhesive film stays in place for 5 to 10 days and then peels off.

• **Don't scratch yourself:** the film may peel off before the wound has healed properly.

• Don't apply liquid medications or ointments: the film may peel off before the wound has healed properly.


• Keep the wound dry and protected. If it gets wet accidently in the shower or the bath, dry the adhesive carefully with a soft towel and with a medium temperature hair-drier.

• **Don't get the wound wet** or bathe until the adhesive peels off on its own.



• Cover the wound with a clean dry bandage if you need to protect it.

• Protect the wound from further injury until the skin has healed.



• Protect the wound from prolonged exposure to sunlight or sun lamps while you are wearing the adhesive film.

Consult your doctor if...

• You have a fever.

• There is an increase in the temperature of the affected area, the pain or the reddening.

- The edges of the wound come apart.
- The wound has purulent discharge.

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
